professor at oxford which derives from this volume and stands as the briefest and most pithy
version of his famous essay two concepts of liberty political ideas in the romantic age is the only
book in which the great intellectual historian isaiah berlin lays out in one continuous account most
of his key insights about the period he made his own written for a series of lectures at bryn mawr
college in 1952 and heavily revised and expanded by berlin afterward the book argues that the
political ideas of 1760 1830 are still largely ours down to the language and metaphors they are
expressed in berlin provides a vivid account of some of the era s most influential thinkers including
rousseau fichte hegel helvetius condorcet saint simon and schelling written in berlin s
characteristically accessible style this is his longest single text distilling his formative early work
and containing much that is not to be found in his famous essays the book is of great interest both
for what it reveals about the continuing influence of romantic political thinking and for what it
shows about the development of berlin s own influential thought the book has been carefully
prepared by berlin s longtime editor henry hardy and joshua l cherniss provides an illuminating
introduction that sets it in the context of berlin s life and work

figures berlin argues helped to shape twentieth century nationalism existentialism democracy totalitarianism and our ideas about heroic individuals self fulfillment and the exalted place of art this new edition illustrated for the first time also features a new foreword by philosopher john gray in which he discusses berlin s belief that the influence of romanticism has been unpredictable and contradictory in the extreme fuelling anti liberal political movements but also reinvigorating liberalism a revised text and a new appendix that includes some of berlin s correspondence about the lectures and the reactions to them

in this volume a team of three dozen international experts presents a fresh picture of literary prose fiction in the romantic age seen from cross cultural and interdisciplinary perspectives the work treats the appearance of major themes in characteristically romantic versions the power of romantic discourse to reshape imaginative writing and a series of crucial reactions to the impact of romanticism on cultural life down to the present both in europe and in the new world through its combination of chapters on thematic generic and discursive features romantic prose fiction achieves a unique theoretical stance by considering the opinions of primary romantics and their successors not as guiding truths by which to define the permanent meaning of romanticism but as data of cultural history that shed important light on an evolving civilization special offer 30 discount for a complete set order 5 vols the romanticism series in the comparative history of literatures in european languages is the result of a remarkable international collaboration the editorial team coordinated the efforts of over 100 experts from more than two dozen countries to produce five independently conceived yet interrelated volumes that show not only how romanticism developed and spread in its principal european homelands and throughout the new world but also the ways in which the affected literatures in reaction to romanticism have redefined themselves on into modernism a glance at the index of each volume quickly reveals the extraordinary richness of the series total contents romantic irony sets the broader experimental parameters of comparison by concentrating on the myriad expressions of irony as one of the major impulses in the romantic philosophical and artistic revolution and by combining cross cultural and interdisciplinary studies with special attention also to literatures in less widely diffused language streams romantic drama traces creative innovations that deeply altered the understanding of genre at large fed popular imagination through vehicles like the opera and laid the foundations for a modernist theater of the absurd romantic poetry demonstrates deep patterns and a sharing of crucial themes of the revolutionary age which underlie the lyrical expression that flourished in so many languages and environments nonfictional romantic prose assists us in coping with the vast array of writings from the personal and intimate sphere to modes of public discourse including romanticism s own self commentary in theoretical statements on the arts society life the sciences and more nor are the discursive dimensions of imaginative literature neglected in the closing volume romantic prose fiction where the basic romantic themes and story types the romance novel novella short story and other narrative forms are considered throughout europe and the new world this enormous realm is seen not just in terms of romantic theorizing but in the light of the impact of romantic ideas and narration on later generations as an aid to readers the introduction to romantic prose fiction explains the relationships among the volumes in the series and carries a listing of their tables of contents in an appendix no other series exists comparable to these volumes which treat the entirety of romanticism as a cultural happening across the whole breadth of the old and new worlds and thus render a complex picture of european spiritual strivings in the late eighteenth and the nineteenth centuries a heritage still very close to our age

i was exhausted at the end yet i am sure that if ever i saw heard anyone in a true state of inspiration it was then so wrote isaiah berlin s secretary lelia brodersen to a friend in 1952 after hearing one of berlin s mary flexner lectures at bryn mawr college pennsylvania political ideas in the romantic age written in preparation for these lectures was heavily revised by berlin afterwards though he never brought it to final published form but it is a work of the greatest interest both for what berlin says about his subject and for what it tells us about his own intellectual development it is the only text he ever wrote in which he laid out in one connected account most of his key insights about the history of ideas in the period which he made his own the romantic age the bridge between the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries this is also the mine from which berlin quarried many of his well known later publications including two concepts of liberty historical inevitability and his essays on vico and herder the continuities and changes that appear when the earlier and later versions of his ideas are compared throw new light on his thought written in berlin s

characteristically accessible style the book also contains much that is not to be found elsewhere in his writings it is a distillate of his formative early work in the history of ideas and the longest continuous text he ever wrote the often problematic script left by berlin has been edited for publication by henry hardy joshua cherniss contributes an introduction setting the work in its context in berlin's life and work and a bibliography of related works by berlin and others

the cold war roots of liberalism's present crisis a daring new book becca rothfeld washington post a fascinating and combative intellectual history gideon rachman financial times by the middle of the twentieth century many liberals looked glumly at the world modernity had brought about with its devastating wars rising totalitarianism and permanent nuclear terror they concluded that far from offering a solution to these problems the ideals of the enlightenment including emancipation and equality had instead created them the historian of political thought samuel moyn argues that the liberal intellectuals of the cold war era among them isaiah berlin gertrude himmelfarb karl popper judith shklar and lionel trilling transformed liberalism but left a disastrous legacy for our time in his iconoclastic style moyn outlines how cold war liberals redefined the ideals of their movement and renounced the moral core of the enlightenment for a more dangerous philosophy preserving individual liberty at all costs in denouncing this stance as well as the recent nostalgia for cold war liberalism as a means to counter illiberal values moyn presents a timely call for a new emancipatory and egalitarian liberal philosophy a path to undoing the damage of the cold war and to ensuring the survival of liberalism

the rich legacy of german romanticism is the focus of the sixteen essays by north american and european scholars written expressly for this volume although most of the essays are concerned with the echoes of romanticism in literature and especially in the works of individual writers e g b chner m rike nietzsche thomas mann hesse musil and christa wolf the political and philosophical implications of romantic thought and ideas as well as their influence on the fine arts are examined the book is a tribute to hans eichner one of the most outstanding scholars in the field of romanticism
